### Remembering the 1918 International Psychoanalytic Congress in Budapest

#### ESSAYS

In the essay section of this issue we publish a selection of papers presented at the 5<sup>th</sup> International Psychoanalytic Congress held in Budapest in 1918. Most of them have not been translated into Hungarian so far. After the conference report of **Sándor Ferenczi** and **Antal Freund** we publish a few papers of the symposium on war neurosis: the lecture of **Sándor Ferenczi** and **Karl Abraham**, as well as **Sigmund Freud**'s introductory essay. From the conference program we also publish **Freud**'s lecture, "Lines of Advance in Psycho-analytic Therapy" that stresses the state of abstinence and the avoidance of too early satisfaction as a requirement of successful analysis.

The study of **Melinda Friedrich**, "The Fifth International Psychoanalytic Congress of Budapest in 1918 in the Contemporary Daily Press" offers a look at the event from the perspective of the contemporary newspaper reader by showing not only how the congress was received and reported by the various dailies, but also by painting a picture of the context of the news.

**VIOLETTA TÓTH-VARGA, ANDREA DÚLL: “Those with heartache will be healed by this landscape...” Emotion regulation in the old coffee houses of Pest in an analytical oriented environmental psychological approach**

The study demonstrates how certain elements of the psychoanalytic approach can be transferred into an environmental psychological research and by doing so how the two branches of psychology can mutually enrich one another. The paper considers turn-of-the-century Budapest coffee houses as models, which the authors investigate as a “good environment” and present how psychodynamic points of view can be validated in the environmental psychological analysis of socio-physical spaces. They illustrate the emotion regulatory role of socio-physical environments through place-identity and place-attachment and demonstrate it through a specific model.
