# ZSOLT HAJNAL: Ulitskaya's homing pigeon. The ecology of reading: literature as the medium of hate rhetorical strategies

The paper, analyzing the Russian writer Lyudmila Ulitskaya's short story, "Golubchik" (Pigeon) shows how a literary text can become the medium of hate rhetorical – in this case homophobic – strategies. The short story presents Slava and the much older Romanovich and searches for the origin of Slava's homosexuality. The intertextual relations, symbols and narrative turns all imply that the author represents same-sex sexuality from a pathologizing perspective. The paper presents and analyzes these aspects of the text.

# ESZTER EDINA MOLNÁR: Additions to Géza Csáth's book, The psychological mechanism of mental illnesses

In 1909 Géza Csáth, mostly known as a novel writer, became a trainee at the Psychiatric and Neurological Clinic of the Medical Faculty of the Budapest University directed by the conservative neurologist and psychiatrist Ernő Moravcsik. In 1911, at the age of 24, he published a book, which contains a study inspired by psychoanalysis about Gizella Kohn, a female patient treated here, and a psychoanalytic study connected to his own Jung-based theory. The aim of this paper is to put the book in a biographical context, to collect the main data of its origins in Csáth's personal sources, correspondence and diary, and to delineate the role of relevant persons in the creation of the book.

## ORSOLYA GÁBORJÁNI: The desire of the mother in women – the roots and symptoms of the Persephone-phenomenon

The paper explores the syndrome labeled as 'Persephone-phenomenon' characterized by younger women's strong desire and dependence on older women. The author approached the topic by means of retrospective in-depth interviews with a special attention to the aspects of developmental and personality psychology. She asked questions on the subject's childhood, her early relationship to the parents and to significant others. Seven interviews have been recorded and transcribed. According to the interviews the life of these young women is characterized by drifting, i.e. they feel that 'things just happen' to them. They are not able to say 'no', similar to the mythological Persephone who drifted from her mother to her husband and from her husband to her mother, in eternal recurrence.
